Domestic, foreign tensions rise up in Israel

cy front as well. The UAE on Monday requested an "immediate" UN Security Council meeting to discuss the worsening violence in the occupied Palestinian territories.

UN diplomats told The National that the meeting would take place at 3pm in New York on Tuesday and would feature Norwegian diplomat Tor Wennesland, the UN special coordinator for the Middle East peace process.

In a statement issued on Monday, Lana Nusseibeh, UAE's Ambassador to the UN, said she is "deeply concerned" about the escalating violence in the Occupied Palestinian Territory and called for the UN Security Council meeting to address it "immediately."

"These are not isolated incidents—they're part of a pattern of violence and unilateral actions that are costing lives and hampering the prospects for a two-State solution,"



she said.

Meanwhile, following settler attacks on Palestinians in the occupied West Bank, Israeli opposition leader Yair Lapid slammed the coalition government on Monday and accused Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu of "losing control" over Israel's security. "What happened [on Sun-

day] is complete anarchy," Lapid told his party, Yesh Atid, referring to the settler violence at the Palestinian village of Huwara. "This anarchy is created because in this government, everyone has their own policy."

This is while some Israeli officials are urging Netanyahu to launch a military operation on Palestinian Authority (PA). The head of the Settlements Council in the occupied West Bank, Yossi Dagan on Monday called on Netanyahu to launch a military operation against the PA.

"We demand from our government to uproot all sources of terrorism, and collect all weapons in the West Bank," Dagan was quoted by Channel 12 as

saying. The Israeli official also urged Netanyahu "to restrict the movement of militants and re-establish security checkpoints." Describing the PA as a "terrorist organization", Dagan stressed that the authority was behind the "wave of operations against Israelis.

The legislation does allow for TikTok use in certain cases, including for national security, law enforcement and research purposes.

TikTok spokesperson Brooke Oberwetter said Monday, "The ban of TikTok on federal devices passed in December without any deliberation, and unfortunately that approach has served as a blueprint for other world

governments. These bans are little more than political theatre.'

Russia slams EU's 10th package of sanctions



ANADOLU AGENCY - Russian Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova on Tuesday called the EU's 10th package of sanctions against Russia, adopted on Feb. 25, "a slow-acting poison" killing the bloc's economic sovereignty.

In a statement, Zakharova said by targeting Russia the EU is imposing sanctions on itself and may do it as long as it wants, because it will only lead to its dependence on "direct competitors."

"It is difficult to disagree with the head of the European diplomacy, Josep Borrell, who said in the European Parliament on Feb. 15 this year that sanctions are 'a slow-acting poison.' But it 'kills', first of all, the economic sovereignty of the European Union," Zakharova stressed.

'Smugglers' identified in Italian migrant boat

Partial results from Nigeria's presidential election show Tinubu leading

Provisional results from Nigeria's disputed presidential election over the weekend showed Bola Tinubu from the ruling party in the lead, a Reuters tally of votes in 25 of the country's 36 states showed on Tuesday.

Electoral commission results from the states showed Tinubu of the All Progressives Congress party (APC) was ahead with

about 36 per cent or 7 million of valid votes counted, with Atiku Abubakar of the main opposition People's Democratic Party (PDP) trailing close behind with 30 per cent or nearly 6 million valid votes.

Peter Obi of the smaller Labour Party got 20 per cent or about 3.8 million votes. More results were expected to show the winner later on Tuesday.

The preliminary results were announced in the states by Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) officers and will still have to be presented at the commission's national collation centre in the federal capital Abuja.

But opposition parties have rejected the results as the product of a flawed process, which suffered

multiple technical difficulties owing to the introduction of new technology by the Independent National **Electoral Commission** (INEC).
