### **Iranian** artists attending exhibition in Türkiye

# 16 Iranian children awarded in Japan's painting contest

Thivein Nethdinu Mawalla Vithanage from Sri Lanka, Ninlada Anowannaphan from Thailand, Daria Gurenko from Ukraine and Maho Yaguchi from Japan. The Ie-no-Hikari Associa-

## Six Iranian films to be screened at **Moscow festival**



## 1,000-year-old stone tablet may've been a Maya sports 'scoreboard'

An ancient stone "scoreboard" likely used in a soccer-like ball game was discovered at an archeological site in Mexico earlier this week, archaeologists said.

Found at the Maya Chichen Itza site, researchers and archeologists said the circular stone's diameter was just over 32 centimeters (or just over 12 inches), and it weighed 40 kilograms (about 88 pounds), according to a statement from Mexico's National Institute of Anthropology and History on Twitter. The stone, which is believed to be a kind of scoreboard, dates from between 800 C.E. and 900 CE, Science Alert reported. "In this Maya site, it is rare to find hieroglyphic writing, let alone a complete text," said Francisco Perez, one of the archaeologists coordinating the investigation, according to Reuters. The stone appears to show two figures in the center, with hieroglyphics surrounding the outer edge. One is wearing a feather headdress, and the other – presumed to be his opponent – is





**MEHR** – Seven pottery objects belonging to the first millennium BCE were discovered in Iran's northwestern province of Zanjan, a local official said. The commander of police in charge of preserving the cultural heritage in Zanjan pointed out that one smuggler has been detained in this regard, Nasser Habibian added.

The ancient objects, including five pottery jars and two bowls, were seized in Khodabandeh County, he noted.

Six Iranian films will be screened at the 45th edition of Moscow International Film Festival (MIFF), slated to be held April 20-27. Animation movies, 'Loopetou,' directed by Abbas Askari; 'Bisotun,' by Ali Masoumi; and 'Broken,' by Farzaneh Omidvarnia. as well as a documentary film, 'Ali against Ali,' by Alireza Rafogaran, will attend the event, reported Mehr news agency. Previously, it was announced that an Iranian documentary film, 'Mama Shokooh's House,' directed by Mehdi Bakhshi-Moqaddam, will participate in the Competition Section,

and a short film. 'Where It Begins,' directed by Amirhossein Talebi and Mohsen Asdaghpour, will be screened at the Short Film Competition Section of the event. The Russian festival is one of the oldest world film forums (second after the Venice Film Festival). The festival began in 1935; however, in subsequent years, the festival was not held regularly. Therefore, the festival has officially been counted down since 1959, when it was renewed and turned into a regular event. MIFF is accredited by the International Federation of Film Producers

Associations (FIAPF).

adorned with a "snake turban," reserved for high-ranking individuals in Maya society.

Experts are now in the process of analyzing and interpreting the stone and taking steps to prepare it for conservation.

Iconography experts identified the two figures on the stone as playing the ball game "pelota" - a team game played with a heavy rubber ball, according to the BBC.

Mesoamerican people played the ball game as a form of traditional practice, and it is thought to have had ritual connotations, per Reuters. The Chichen Itza in the

Yucatán peninsula of Mexico is a historical center of Maya civilization, and it is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
