Army Navy's 90th flotilla returns home

The Iranian Navy's 90th flotilla of warships arrived home on Tuesday after sailing in international waters for 84 days to ensure the security of Iranian and foreign merchant ships.

A number of naval officials including the Army Navy Commander for Coordinating Affairs Admiral Babak Balouch were participating in a ceremony on Tuesday in Bandar Abbas to welcome the return of the Navy's 90th flotilla of warships, according to Mehr news agency.

"In order to ensure maritime security and maintain and protect commercial fleets, the Army Navy conducts constant maritime operations," Admiral Balouch stated in his address to the ceremony.

"The 90th Fleet has taken measures to ensure the security of all communication lines by sailing in the Gulf of Aden and the



Red Sea while escorting and supporting Iranian and foreign commercial vessels that are present in those regions," he added.

The naval official further said that foreign sanctions cannot prevent Iran from sailing its merchant ships in international waters.

Putin praises Russian troops for putting down mutiny

President Vladimir Putin praised members of Russia's military and security forces in a ceremony on Tuesday as he sought to reassert his authority following an aborted mutiny by mercenaries led by Wagner Group chief Yevgeny Prigozhin.

A jet linked to Prigozhin arrived in Belarus from Russia, believed to be carrying the mercenary boss into exile, three days after he abruptly called off his mutiny with his fighters bearing down on the capital, Reuters reported.

Authorities dropped a criminal case against Wagner, state news agency RIA reported, apparently fulfilling one condition of a deal agreed late on Saturday that defused the crisis, Reuters reported.

Putin told some 2,500 security personnel mustered on a square in the Kremlin complex that the people and the armed forces had

stood together in opposition to the rebel mercenaries.

He was joined by Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu, whose dismissal had been one of the mutineers' main demands.

Putin also requested a minute of silence to honour Russian military pilots killed in the revolt. The fighters had shot down several aircraft during their run towards Moscow, although they faced no resistance on the ground.

Prigozhin, a former Putin ally and ex-convict whose mercenaries have fought the bloodiest battles of the Ukraine war and taken heavy casualties, had said he would go to neighbouring Belarus at the invitation of its president, close Putin ally Alexander

Lukashenko. Putin said in a televised address on Monday night that the mutiny leaders had betrayed their moth-

erland, although he did not mention Prigozhin by name. Wagner fighters would be permitted to establish themselves in Belarus, join the Russian military or go home, he said.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told a news briefing on Tuesday the deal ending the mutiny was being implemented, and he had no information on where Prigozhin was. He also said he did not know how many Wagner fighters would sign contracts with the Defence Ministry.

He dismissed the idea that Putin's grip on power had been shaken by the mutiny, calling such thoughts "hvsteria". Prigozhin, 62, said he

launched the mutiny to save his group after being ordered to place it under command of the Defence Ministry. His fighters had halted

their campaign on Saturday to avert bloodshed after nearly reaching Moscow, and regretted being forced to shoot down aircraft on the way, he said.

Hamas slams Israeli plan to build new settlements

US 'deeply troubled' by approval of settler permits

The Palestinian Hamas resistance movement has strongly condemned the Israeli regime's decision to construct thousands of new settler units in the occupied West Bank as "open aggression" on Palestinians despite international outcry.

The United States on Monday objected to the decision by Israel's nationalist-religious cabinet to approve the construction of around 5,700 additional housing units for Israeli settlers in the occupied West Bank.

The United States was "deeply troubled" by the move, State Department spokesperson Matthew Miller told reporters, adding that U.S. officials had made clear publicly and privately to Israel their opposition to moves that advance settlements, Reuters reported.

Most countries deem the settlements, built on land captured by Israel in the 1967 Middle East war, as illegal. Their presence is one of the fundamental issues in the Israeli-Palestinian

conflict. "We believe that settlements are an impediment to a negotiated two-state solution," said Miller.

'Open aggression'

Also, Hamas, in a statement released on Monday, criticized the plan as "a new crime that amounts to open-ended aggression against the Palestinian nation." Press TV reported. "The Israeli decision adds up to the list of crimes that the occupying Tel Aviv regime is perpetrating across the West Bank," it added. "Such crimes push Palestinians to stand united in the face of Israeli crimes." Hamas further called on the Arab and Muslim nations, as well as freedom-loving people worldsupport the steadfastness of Palestinians until they fulfill their aspirations to return and establish an independent sovereign state. The statement came hours after Israeli authorities approved the construction of 5,623 new illegal settler units in the West Bank, in continuation of its illegal settlement expansion and land grab activities in the occupied territories.

According to a report by the official Palestinian WAFA news agency, the approval of the construction of new illegal settler units includes depositing plans for the construction of 4,291 new colonial settler units. which constitutes an advanced stage of planning and construction by the occupation authorities.

The approval also includes

1,332 building plans which are submitted and will be approved after a session for hearing objections, before final approval and preparation of tenders, it added. Israeli media outlets said 1.000 new settler units, more than what Israel's far-right administration approved last week, will be built in Eli settlement, south of the northern occupied West Bank city of Nablus. The approval came after an agreement between Israeli

prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu, minister for military affairs Yoav Gallant, and finance minister Bezalel Smotrich, the reports added.

More than 600.000 Israelis live in over 230 settlements built since the 1967 Israeli occupation of the West Bank and East Al-Quds.

UN peacekeeping mission in Mali to end on June 30



REUTERS - The United Nations plans to end its decade-long peacekeeping mission in Mali on June 30 and will withdraw all personnel within six months, according to a draft Security Council resolution proposed by France and seen by Reuters. The withdrawal of the 13,000-strong mission, known as MINUSMA, would come after years of tensions between the UN and Mali's military junta came to a head this month when Mali Foreign Minister Abdoulaye Diop asked the force to leave "without delay".

EU, UNESCO to help developing countries shape **AI rules**

AFP - The European Union will help fund a UNESCO scheme supporting developing countries as they create laws regulating artificial intelligence, the UN cultural body said Tuesday. Four million euros (\$4.4 million) from Brussels will go towards organising events and advising governments.

Trump heard discussing secret documents on tape

Former US president Donald Trump can be heard discussing secret documents he had apparently held on to after leaving the White House and acknowledging they had not been declassified, in an audio recording aired by US media.

The two-minute clip, played by CNN late Monday and later obtained by ABC and CBS, comes from an interview Trump gave at his Bedminster, New Jersey golf club in July 2021 for people working on a memoir by his former chief of staff Mark Meadows, AFP reported. Parts of the recording's transcript were cited as evidence in special counsel Jack Smith's 49-page indictment of Trump on charges he had mishandled classified documents after leaving office.

The audio file includes a moment when Trump seems to indicate he is holding a secret Pentagon document with plans to attack Iran.

"These are the papers," Trump says in the recording, a quote that was not included in the indictment.

He also refers to some-

thing as "highly confidential" and "this is secret information" as he seems to be showing something to the others in the room. "This was done by the military and given to me," Trump continues, before noting that one would need to "declassify it" for it to be used in the book. "You see, as president I could have declassified it. Now I can't, you know," he says. "Now we have a problem,"

Trump earlier this month denied 37 counts of wilfully mishandling US government secrets and conspiring to prevent their return, becoming the first US president to face federal criminal charges.

After the recording was released, Trump lashed out on his Truth Social website, calling Smith "deranged" and baselessly accusing the prosecutor of conspiring with the Justice Department and

FBI to "illegally" leak and mischaracterize the tape. He claimed the audio was "actually an exoneration, rather than what they would have you believe." The government accuses 77-year-old Trump – who is vying to win back the

White House next year - of willfully hoarding dozens of classified documents he took unlawfully to his beachfront mansion in Florida, refusing to return them and conspiring to obstruct investigators seeking their recovery.

REUTERS - The UN refugee agency warned on Tuesday that an earlier projection that conflict in Sudan would prompt 1 million people to flee across its borders is likely to be surpassed.

So far, the conflict between warring military factions that began in mid-April has caused nearly 600,000 people to escape into neighbouring countries including Egypt, Chad, South Sudan and Central African Republic.

West Ham reject Manchester City's £90m bid for captain

Arsenal are expected to make a third bid for the 24-year-old England midfielder. The Gunners' second proposal of an initial £75m in four payments, plus £15m in add-ons, was turned down by West Ham last week. Rice's contract with the Hammers expires in 2024, although it has the option for a one-year extension until the summer of 2025. Following the club's Europa Conference League victory over Fiorentina earlier this month, chairman David Sullivan said he was "99%" sure Rice would leave West Ham this summer. Although they have lined up Chelsea's Mateo Kovacicina£25mdeal,thelossof Ilkay Gundogan to Barcelona means City manager Pep Guardiola is keen to bolster his midfield options, with Rice viewed as the ideal candidate.

Discrimination 'widespread' in English, Welsh cricket

Racism, sexism, classism and elitism are "widespread" in English and Welsh cricket, according to a long-awaited independent report. The Independent Commission for Equity in Cricket (ICEC) has delivered its findings from a two-year investigation, BBC wrote on Tuesday.

The ICEC has made 44 recommendations, including that the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) makes an unreserved public apology for its failings. ECB chair Richard Thompson said: "We will use this moment to game.

Women are treated as "subordinate" to men at all levels of the sport.

There is a prevalence of "elitism and class-based discrimination" in cricket.

Black cricket has been failed and the ECB must develop a plan to re-

vive it. Many who experience discrimination do not report it because of a report also highlight that for too long women and black people were neglected. We are truly sorry for this.

"This report makes clear that historic structures and systems have failed to prevent discrimination, and highlights the pain and exclusion this has caused.

"I am determined that this wakeup call for cricket in England and Wales should not be wasted. We will use this moment to demonstrate that it is a game for all and we have a duty to put this right for current and future generations."

The recommendations also include the equalisation of match fees between the England women's and men's teams with immediate effect, that the ECB reports on the state of equity in cricket every three years and the removal of annual fixtures between Eton and Harrow schools and Oxford

reset cricket."

The ICEC was announced by the ECB in March 2021 in the wake of global movements such as Black Lives Matter and Me Too.

It opened an online call for evidence in November of that year, receiving 4,156 responses. In March 2022, a call for written evidence resulted in more than 150 responses.

Among those to give evidence include England men's Test captain Ben Stokes, women's captain Heather Knight, former men's captain Joe Root, World Cup-winning skipper Eoin Morgan, and Azeem Rafiq - the former Yorkshire player and racism whistleblower. In a damning 317-page report

called Holding Up A Mirror To Cricket, the ICEC concluded that: "Structural and institutional racism" continues to exist within the distrust in the authorities.

Umpires regularly ignore abuse and dismiss complaints in both the professional and recreational games.

"There remains a stark reality that cricket is not a 'game for everyone' and it is absolutely essential that the work required to achieve that ambition must begin immediately," wrote ICEC chair Cindy Butts. "Be in no doubt, what is needed now is leadership. I very much hope that the recommendations we make in this report will be adopted and driven forward by the ECB and all others in leadership positions."

The report praised the ECB for being "brave" enough to open itself to independent scrutiny.

Thompson, who became ECB chair last September, offered an "unreserved" apology.

"Cricket should be a game for everyone, and we know that this has not always been the case," he said. "Powerful conclusions within the and Cambridge universities from Lord's.

Tehran, Astana target \$1b in agro-trade

Iran and Kazakhstan have targeted \$1 billion of trade in the agriculture and food industry sectors, announced Deputy Agriculture Minister Alireza Peymanpak, who headed a trade delegation to the Central Asian state.

During a visit to Kazakhstan, the Iranian delegation attended two specialized business meetings for the introduction of new business and joint investment opportunities in Almaty and Astana, IRNA reported.

During the meetings, the two sides discussed the requirements for facilitating joint agriculture cooperation between the two countries.

Peymanpak also held talks with Kazakh officials including the country's deputy prime minister. the minister of trade, the minister of agriculture, and the governor of Almaty, in which he introduced new opportunities for cooperation in various fields like exporting fruits and vegetables, dairy, and aquatic products, as well as providing Iran's needs for wheat and meat direct-



ly from Kazakhstan. Solving challenges faced by the two countries in the field of veterinary medicine, logistics, financial and banking relations as well as the guarantees related to commercial

contracts centered on agricultural products and animal husbandry were also among the focal points of negotiations between Peymanpak and the Kazakh authorities. The value of Iran's non-

oil exports to Kazakhstan increased by 67 percent in the first month of the current Iranian year (March 21-April 20), compared to the first month of the past year, the spokesman of Trade Development Committee of the Iranian Chamber of Industry, Mine, and Trade has announced. Rouhollah Latifi said that Kazakhstan imported nonoil commodities worth \$12.5 million from Iran in the first month of this year.



Iran, Vietnam emphasize deepening industrial-trade cooperation

Iran's deputy minister of industry stressed the expansion of industrial cooperation between Iran and Vietnam, relying on the private sector, adding that strengthening cooperation between private and industrial sectors is the fastest way of interaction between the two countries.

Ali Rasoulian, who is also the chief executive of Iran Small Industries and Industrial Parks Organization (ISIPO) made the remarks in Guangzhou, China, on Tuesday in a meeting with Vietnamese Deputy Minister of Industry and Trade Do Thang Hai, reported Tasnim news agency. The meeting was held on the sidelines of the 18th China International Small and Medium Enterprises Fair (CISMEE) Expounding on the high capacities and capabilities of his organization, Rasoulian emphasized the exchange of technical know-how between Iran and Vietnam. Although sanctions have created restrictions for Iran in international arenas, Iranian firms continue their trade and economic activities strongly, he underlined Stressing the need for the conclusion of a memorandum of understanding (MoU) between the two countries to deepen relations between industrial and trade units. he added that the text of the proposed MoU will be compiled between ISIPO and Vietnam. He pointed to the high capacities and capabilities of Iran's southern province of Fars, saying that Fars is one of the leading provinces of the country in the field of food industries. The Vietnamese deputy minister of industry, for his part, emphasized expanding and developing cooperation in the fields of industry and technology and noted that the two countries eye strengthening bilateral cooperation in different fields.

Global energy report confirms rise in Iran crude output

Figures from the Statistical Review of World Energy, an annual report published by the Energy Institute (EI), confirmed that there was a major rise in Iranian crude oil output in 2022 despite the continued pressure of US sanctions on the Iranian petroleum sector.

The report showed that Iran's oil output, including production of crude oil, condensate and NGL, rose by 4.6% last year compared to 2021 to reach an average of 3.822 million barrels per day (bpd), Press TV reported.

Figures in the report showed that Iran's combined production of crude oil and condensate, which is a very light form of oil, rose by 129,000 bpd or 4.1% in 2022 from figures reported in the year before. Iran's output of natural gas liquids (NGL) also rose by an average of 40,000 bpd or 8.5% from 2021 to reach 509,000 bpd last year, said the report.

It said that fuel production in Iranian refineries rose by 2.2% year on year in 2022 to 2.397 million bpd while oil refining capacity in the country rose 2.3% to 2.67 million bpd over the same period.

Natural gas production in Iran reached 259.4 billion cubic meters last year, up 1.1% from 2021, showed EI figures.

As of 2023, the EI has takand gas supermajor bp. en over publication of the Statistical Review of World Energy, a report that was published previously for more than 70 years by oil

Iran has demonstrated significant progress in managing and controlling the COVID-19 pandemic, with multiple days recording zero deaths and the country experiencing favorable conditions. This achievement comes despite facing numerous sanctions from certain powers claiming to uphold human rights, which have hindered the import of vital medications and healthcare facilities necessary for treating the disease.

In pursuit of aquatic preservation Environmental faction seeks permanent ban on industrial trawling

She stressed that economic activities must align with the country's environmental capacity to prevent degradation.

Before the trawl fishing ban, local fishing communities expressed dissatisfaction with the depletion of aquatic resources caused by industrial trawling vessels. Rafiei revealed that these vessels received fuel subsidies from the government while claiming to create emphasized the need for environmentally friendly fishing methods to replace destructive trawl fishing. Despite allocating the required amount of money for membership fees in international conventions to obtain fishing licenses in the Indian Ocean, none of the mentioned ships have begun operations in those waters.

In their petition, local fishermen expressed gratitude for the two-year ban on fishing trawlers in the Persian Gulf and the Sea of Oman, which has led to the relative revival of aquatic resources and improved the food basket of indigenous people. The petitioners urged the members of the parliamentary environmental faction, academic staff. and officials to take decisive action regarding the permanent ban of trawlers. The local fishermen's letter emphasized that industrial fishing vessels, under the pretext of having a fishing license, operated without proper monitoring and supervision by the Iranian Fisheries Organization. These vessels encroached upon the waters of the southern coast, destroying habitats and looting valuable aquatic resources and species, despite warnings from local fishermen.

Official: 370,000 Iranian students registered for summer camps

The Deputy Director of Education and Culture at Iran's Ministry of Education, Asghar Baqerzadeh, revealed that 370,000 students have registered for summer camps thus far. Baqerzadeh emphasized that

this year's summer slogan is "non-stop training," with the aim of providing educational opportunities through all institu-

tions, families, and schools, Mehr News reported. Since late May, approximately 25,000 camps have been established in 20 percent of the nation's schools, along with 1,000 cultural and educational centers within ministry facilities and 1,000 bases in Center for the Intellectual Development of Child and Adolescents across various cities and regions. Registration for these camps will continue until June 28. Students have until July 6 to register in these camps, which can be accessed through the education services portal at https://my.medu.ir. The portal allows families, students, and other interested parties to learn about the summer camps, view the fields, locations, and event times, and participate in the programs. Bagerzadeh noted that all camps registered in the system must declare the amount they claim as tuition or tuition assistance, ensuring proper oversight. While some programs and activities are free, skill and professional training courses may require special tools, equipment, and expert trainers, resulting in tuition fees. However, the official clarified that tuition fees are not entirely optional and that there is a ceiling for such fees. The Deputy Director advised parents and families to utilize summer education centers close to their homes which employ well-known, suitable trainers and teachers approved by the Ministry of Education. Additionally, he urged families to verify that there are no unconventional fees by checking the numbers recorded in the database.

The leader of Iran Parliament's environmental faction announced the end of the plundering of the nation's aquatic life and expressed determination to permanently ban industrial trawling in the country.
