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Russia learning sanctions evasion from Iran: Report

Even though the US and the EU are imposing new sanctions on Russia and Iran almost every day, Moscow has been more successful in evading the harsher impacts of sanctions after picking up a few lessons from Iran. According to a report by FOX News, companies based in Kyrgyzstan, the UAE, and Serbia are all facing penalties for helping aid Russia's war. "They're making their alter-

native web of alliances in the world," said former US ambassador to Poland, Daniel Fried.



"Iran is certainly helping Russia. It's an alliance of convenience." The two countries are trying to ease the economic pressure that

Iran oil income in 2022 beat post- JCPOA era last year

Iran's oil revenues in 2022 hit 42.6 billion, exceeding the country's oil revenues in the first year of implementation of the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (ICPOA), according to the statistical bulletin of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) in 2023. Iran's oil revenues in the first year of implementation of the JCPOA stood at \$41.1 billion, Tasnim news agency reported. The rise in Iran's oil exports to 1.4

million barrels of oil per day (bpd) at the end of 2022, according to Kepler statistics, and the price hike of crude oil are the main reasons for Iran's oil revenues reaching the pre-sanctions levels, the report added.

After withdrawal from the 2015 nuclear deal, former US president Donald Trump re-imposed sanctions on Iran as part of what he called a "maximum pressure" campaign against the country. Those sanctions are being enforced to this day by the Joe Biden administration, even though it has repeatedly acknowledged that the policy has been a mistake and a failure.

Tehran says it will not be able to trust Washington as long as Biden continues Trump's wrong policy against Iran.

"You see the Russians beginning to pick up on some of the tactics Page 1 > perfected by the Iranians, as well as continue to deepen their political, economic, and security ties with Tehran," said Behnam Ben Taleblu, a security expert. "Iran has a masterclass in sanctions-busting, helping to teach the Russian Federation at the moment."

Iran's largest source of revenue is from oil exports. Since the US re-imposed economic sanctions, Iran's output has hit a new high despite the additional pressure. "While these sanctions remain on the books, the problem here is that they're not being actively enforced. This lack of active enforcement, coupled with a very public desire for diplomacy and de-escalation with Iran, is encouraging more risk-tolerant actors to buy more Iranian oil," Taleblu said. "Iran continues to thumb its nose at US sanctions," US Congressman Mike Lawler said.

Page 1 >called a recent desecration of the Muslims' holy book in Sweden as a bitter, conspiratorial and dangerous incident, calling for the maximum punishment for the perpetrator.

Ayatollah Khamenei said in a message on Saturday that there is a consensus among all Islamic scholars that the perpetrator of the crime should face the maximum punishment.

On Thursday, Salwan Momika, a Sweden-based Iraqi refugee, desecrated the Muslim holy book during a demonstration outside the Iraqi Embassy in Stockholm amid strict protection provided by the Swedish police. This was the second time Momika was disrespecting the holv book amid the approval of Sweden's authorities. He set a copy of the Qur'an on fire on June 28. Also, members of an Islamophobic group called Danske Patrioter burned the Muslim holy book in front of Iraq's Embassy in the Danish capital city of Copenhagen on Friday.

Ayatollah Khamenei said

that the Swedish government should hand over the perpetrator to the judicial systems of Islamic countries.

"The Swedish government should also know that by supporting a criminal, it has taken a battle formation against the Islamic world and attracted the hatred and enmity of Muslim nations and many of their governments," he said. The sacrilegious move

prompted protests across the Muslim world. People in many countries staged massive rallies to condemn the blasphemous act. On Thursday, demonstra-

tors in Baghdad broke into the Swedish Embassy and set part of it on fire to show their anger at the sacrilegious act.

Iranians also took to the streets across the country after Friday prayers to voice their strong condemnation of the recent desecration of the Holy Qur'an.

People in Lebanon and Pakistan staged similar rallies on Friday.

The Iraqi government has ordered the Swedish ambassador to leave the Arab country and decided to withdraw its envoy from Stockholm.

Sweden's envoys summoned

On Thursday, the Iranian Foreign Ministry summoned the Swedish ambassador to Tehran and conveyed Iran's strong condemnation of the sacrilegious act.

The Danish ambassador was also summoned to the Iranian Foreign Ministry on Saturday. Earlier in the day, Iran's Foreign Ministry spokesman Nasser Kanaani said Denmark must prevent the desecration of the Qur'an and other Muslim sanctities and prosecute those who commit such acts.

Iran has said it will not accept a new Swedish ambassador until Stockholm takes a serious and effective measure to deal with the continuous violation of Islamic sanctities.

Iran's Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian on Friday called for an emergency meeting of the Organization of Islamic Countries (OIC) in a phone call with the group's Secretary General Hissein Ibrahim Taha. The UAE Foreign Ministry also called in Sweden's chargé d'affaires in Abu Dhabi and conveyed its strong objection to the sacrilegious move.

"Sweden has disregarded its international responsibilities and demonstrated a lack of respect for social values in this regard," the Emirati Foreign Ministry said. The Egyptian Foreign Ministry said in a statement that the countries' governments must fulfill their responsibilities to deal with such crimes, prevent their repetition, and punish the perpetrators.

"Egypt's Foreign Ministrv strongly condemns the action of the Swedish authorities in granting permission to an extremist person to repeat the insult to the Holy Qur'an," the statement added. The Kingdom of Jordan condemned the desecration "as a reckless act that fuels hatred, and a manifestation of Islamophobia that incites violence and insult to religions".

The Qatari Foreign Ministry said in a statement that Swedish authorities should take "all the necessary measures to stop these shameful acts".

Sergey Aksyonov, the Kremlin-appointed head of the territory said in a Telegram post that there were no immediate reports of casualties but that authorities were evacuating civilians within a five-kilometer (three-radius) of the blast site, AP reported.

The Ukrainian military appeared to confirm it had launched the drone strike, claiming through its press service that it had destroyed an oil depot and Russian arms warehouses in the Krasnohvardiiske area, although without specifying what weapons were used.

Social media posts circulating on Saturday had earlier referenced unconfirmed reports of "several" drones targeting an oil depot and airstrip, as well as a loud blast resembling the sound of detonating shells. The explosion in Krasnohvardiiske came less than a week after a Ukrainian strike Monday on the crucial Kerch bridge linking Crimea with Russia, which killed two people and left a section of the roadway

Moscow on the same day ended its participation in a wartime deal that allowed Ukrainian grain to be exported through the Black Sea and later pounded Ukraine's seaports with drones and missiles after vowing "retribution" for the attack on the bridge, a key supply route for Russian forces in Ukraine.

On Wednesday, a fire broke out within military training grounds in eastern Crimea that forced the evacuation of more than 2,000 people and the closure of a nearby highway, according to Aksyonov. Neither Moscow nor local Kremlin-appointed authorities gave reasons for the blaze, and Ukraine did not comment.

The Russian company operating the Kerch bridge announced on Saturday morning that it was temporarily halting all traffic across it, without giving reasons. Traffic was later allowed to resume crossing. Also on Saturday, Ukrainian authorities reported that Russian attacks on 11 regions across the country over the previous day killed at least eight civilians and wounded others, as fierce fighting continues in Kyiv's attempts to dislodge Russian forces from territory.

Minister: Iran has long-term plan to repatriate ancient artifacts

Iran's Minister of Cultural Heritage, Tourism, and Handicrafts, Ezzatollah Zarghami, revealed a longterm plan to repatriate ancient artifacts to the country, emphasizing their commitment to the plan. According to ILNA, Zarghami addressed the issue of returning other ancient artifacts, such as the Sasanian bas-relief, to Iran. "We have a long-term plan in this regard, and it is not a mere project; it's a pro-

cess," stated the minister. Zarghami lamented that many valuable Iranian artifacts are currently located in other countries due to various historical reasons.

He pointed out that during the pre-Islamic Republic era, particularly in the Pahlavi era, these countries claimed to have legally acquired and documented these artifacts after taking them out of Iran. When asked whether ancient artifacts could be legally removed from the country, Zarghami re-

plied, "Yes, they claim that these items were acquired through a contractual agreement, and they possess documents. However, we can pursue those cases which we can prove were smuggled, such as the Sasanian soldier's relief, which was a smuggling case that occurred in the 1980s, and we could re-

patriate it." The minister stressed that while some actions may have been deemed legal during the pre-revolution era, they do not recognize the legality of the transactions and commercial activities by individuals and dealers, and they are actively taking legal measures to reclaim these artifacts.

Swedish works banned in Iranian festivals over Qur'an burning

The head of the Cinema Organization of Iran (COI) announced in response to the desecration of the Holy Qur'an in Sweden that, henceforth. Swedish film productions will not be accepted in various Iranian festivals. Mohammad Khazaei pointed out that Islamophobia and offensive behaviors towards the beliefs of Muslims are suspicious actions by some Western communities, Mehr news agency reported.

He added that certain communities in the West are always attempting to conceal their colonial attitudes behind the mask of "freedom of expression" by belittling, undermining, and provoking antagonism towards the values of other religions, especially Islam.

He emphasized that the ugly phenomenon of Islamophobia and Western hostility towards Islam has once again surfaced, regretfully noting that instead of engaging in dialogue for better understanding and sharing religious commonalities, the West has always resorted to destructive, threatening, isolating, antagonizing actions, and promoting religious hatred. This flawed approach has led to the unfortunate reaction of honorable and freedom-seeking Muslims worldwide.

The head of COI also highlighted "the presence of global Zionism's manipulative hands in such incidents, stating that such actions and behavior cannot be assessed as isolated acts of global Zionism but should be considered as part of the premeditated puzzle designed by Zionists to incite religious wars."

Khazaei denounced Sweden's hostile and illogical approach, which disregards

The old traditions and customs of each region have roots in its culture and identity, the preservation of which would lead to the development and maintenance of social cohesion.

A large number of traditional rituals and ceremonies have been prevalent in the northern province of Mazandaran, showing the cultural values and beliefs of its local people. Thus, extensive measures have been carried out in past years to prevent these traditional rituals from fading away.

Javaherdeh village, a popular resort with a pleasant climate, is located 25 kilometers from the center of Ramsar. A number of historically valuable cemeteries and monuments are in the village, one of which is Adineh Mosque, dating back 800 years. The mosque, which has been frequently subjected to natural disasters throughout history, and was once destroyed by fire, was rebuilt again in the past years. Like other old buildings of this village, this mosque was made of wood and mud with no columns.

The building of the old mosque is beautiful and unique in such a way that many tourists travel to the region to visit this monument.

Gelkari (mud-making) is a traditional and religious ritual, attended by thousands of people from Mazandaran and Gilan provinces, which was held in Javaherdeh village in ancient times.

According to historical documents, which are available in Mazandaran Province's Cultural Heritage, Tourism and Handicrafts Organization, the ritual dates back 5,000 years.

On the day of the ceremony, local villagers and livestock breeders milked their animals and prepared a mud mixture of milk and soil. All people, including men and women, young and old, participated in the ceremony to spread the prepared mud on the wall of the mosque, to clean the mosque of any impurity. This rite was not held for many years, but efforts made by the

villagers and related officials caused it to revive again. Director General of Mazandaran Province's Cultural Horitage

Province's Cultural Heritage, Tourism and Handicrafts Organization, Sadeq Barzegar, told IRNA that the ritual was held in Adineh Mosque this year, after a 45-year hiatus, thanks to attempts made by the members of the village's rural management department in cooperation with the locals.

He added that revival of the old rituals and customs would have a positive impact on regional tourism.

He noted that *gelkari* has roots in the religious beliefs of the people who have lived in Javaherdeh village throughout history, pointing out that re-creation of the ritual would help preserve the interior and exterior surface of the old rural houses and mosques.

Due to this geographical feature and its cool and pleasant weather, no wonder that Javaherdeh is a perfect destination in the summer.

When visiting Javaherdeh, it is not only the village that is worth seeing but also the route. The dreamy scenery of clouds and mountains covered with trees will make you speechless. Just like fairy tales, you have to pass all these adventures and a tortuous road to get to the destination.

The first thing you will notice once you enter the village road from Ramsar is its green forests and hills. By the time you reach Javaherdeh, these trees will gradually be replaced by green meadows full of flowers. Have you brought your camera with you? Happy shooting! Adineh Mosque

Looking at Sassanid art as a whole, one reaches the conclusion that it began with a fairly limited range of themes strictly stratified according to genre, es into benedictory symbolism; Sa the symbolic banquet, battles and hunting scenes become ordinary tales of hunting exploits, many feasts and chivalry. o

Sassanid Period the illustrative and ornamental themes played the main role in art, although, of course, the propagandist themes of the "imperial style" also sur-

into Arabic and later also into Persian, a hundred or more vears after the fall of the Sassanid state, or even in revised versions of a comparatively late date. It is difficult to distinguish between their various accretions from different periods, to make any sense of the blending of various styles and genres. In the course of translation from Middle Persian a sort of compendium was usually produced. In official manifestos of the kings and rock inscriptions (3rd century) mention is made of official state records, statutes and codices produced under each king.

tory of the Sassanids - all twenty-seven kings who had ruled, as the manuscript stated, for 433 years, one month and seventeen days. All these kings were portrayed in the manuscript. Another medieval historian, Hamza Isfahani, saw just such a manuscript (or perhaps the very same one). He left a description of the portraits of "kings and courtiers, famous guardians of the fire, all priests and others noted among the Persians". These illustrations were typical official portraits. The crown was precisely depicted, the kings stood or sat on their throne. The manuscript was translated from the original into Arabic for the Caliph Hisham. It was completed in 731 CE and this is probably the earliest record of the translation of Middle Persian works. A few compendiums of the 10th-12th centuries preserve fragments of similar translations and they confirm that in terms of their content such books were records of state affairs, arranged not by year but by separate reigns. Around the 4th century comes the first reliable report of literary works being among such records, and of their being collected into specific anthologies, their abundant subject-matter relating as a rule to distant antiquity. We know in particular of one such story, Rast-sukhan (The Truthful Word). The story has not survived, but apparently it contained the legendary history of the founder of the Sassanid state – Ardashir, the son of Bapak - and was similar to the Book of the Deeds of Ardashir, known in a late Sassanid version (4th century). It is possible that both these works were combined into one text in the 6th century.

The second day of the Asian Karate Senior Championship saw Iranians collect four medals – including a kumite silver for Bahman Asgari – in Melaka, Malaysia, to take the country's medal count to nine.

G20 ministers fail to agree on fossil fuels roadmap

AFP – Energy ministers from the group of 20 nations meeting in India Saturday failed to agree on a roadmap to phase down the use of fossil fuels in the global energy mix.

A final statement after the meeting did not even mention coal, a major contributor to global warming.

The failure to reach agreement in Goa comes despite G7 leaders agreeing in Hiroshima in May to "accelerate the phase-out of unabated fossil fuels" and with global temperatures hitting record highs, triggering floods, storms, and heatwaves.

IEA: Oil demand projections depend on China's growth

Iran exporting packaging paper to Europe, Asia

Economic Desk

A member of the Paper, Cardboard and Cellulose Products Importers Association of Iran announced that the country produces more than 1.6 million tons of packaging paper per annum.

Talking to ISNA on Saturday, Reza Omidi put the domestic needs of packaging paper at 850,000 tons per year, as the country exports more than 65,000 tons of the product to Europe, Asia, and the Persian Gulf littoral states.

He stated that the annual consumption of paper and cardboard in Iran is about 1.9 million tons, as about 1.2 million tons are imported to the country annually.

"At present, 120 plants are operating in the field of

paper production across the country, as their most important problem is the supply of raw materials," Omidi said.

He added: "In the field of printing and writing paper, the country's annual need is about 250,000 tons, of which about 50,000 tons are produced domestically."

Omidi noted that 120,000 tons of sanitary paper are consumed in the country every year, but the domestic production in this field is more than 200,000 tons. The weight of cardboard production in Iran stands at 250,000 tons, of which 110,000 tons are for domestic need and the remaining are exported, he said, noting that the annual production of tissue in Iran hits 175,000 tons as the figure for tissue



consumption of Iran is 160,000 tons. According to statistics, per capita consumption of all types of paper in Iran is 22 kg, in Europe 55 kg and in US 160 kg. Omidi also announced that

Hur al-Azim wetland might dry up completely: Official

The deputy of the natural environment of the Khuzestan Department of the Environment, Adel Mola, pointed out the potential drying up of the Hur al-Azim wetland, a critical ecosystem in the southwestern province.

Mola revealed that the lagoon currently holds only about 40 percent of its water capacity. The combination of high air temperatures and increased evaporation rates threatens to further deplete the lagoon's water levels, according to ISNA.

"For several years, the water rights of Hur al-Azim have been largely ignored, except during floods, or they have been significantly less than the amount allocated for the wetland." Mola said.

Despite recent water releases, the official expressed concern that the water is not reaching the environment. He cited uncontrolled water harvesting upstream for agriculture as a major issue, and called for stricter regulation of farmers and agricultural lands upstream. Mola also criticized the reporting of water inflow into the lagoon, arguing that the figures do not accurately reflect the reality. He pointed out that the water entering the wetland is largely the result of upstream paddy fields or

water lost from farmers.





"One, two or three cubic meters of water is not sufficient for the lagoon. The lagoon needs a strong wave of water to be revived to some extent," he said.

He also highlighted the ongoing legal efforts to secure the water rights of the lagoon, but warned that the process is time-consuming and has not yet yielded any preventative measures to

avert the crisis. "In the first quarter of this year, only 0.4 percent of the water rights of the Hur al-Azim wetland reached it. In this critical situation, at least 20 to 30 percent of the water rights of the Hur al-Azim wetland should have been delivered," Mola stated.

The deputy warned that the current condition of the lagoon is critical, with the decreasing water level posing a serious risk of fires and fish deaths. He suggested that local fishermen might be allowed to catch the remaining fish to prevent a total loss due to dehydration.

Mola also raised concerns about the potential for the wetland to dry up completely, which could lead to the land becoming a dust center, encroachment and occupation of the dry parts of the wetland, fire,

air pollution, and other dangers to the living. In the face of these challenges, Mola emphasized the need for continuous monitoring to prevent the occupation of the wetland lands.

"This work is being done, but if the process is prolonged, there will definitely be people who want to occupy the lands," he concluded.

Extreme heat is killing Italian workers



Stefano Olmastroni, a cleaner, had been tidying shelves in a supermarket selling farm produce in Florence shortly before he died on 13 July, when Italy was in the midst of an anticyclone called Cerberus that pushed temperatures beyond 40C.

Earlier in the day, the 61-year-old told relatives that he was struggling to work in the heat and was feeling sluggish. He was looking forward to resting on his day off the day after, The Guardian reported

Olmastroni, who had heart problems, finished his shift at 3 p.m. and was later found slumped in the changing room.

"When they found him, the temperature in the changing room was 39C," said his niece, Sara Ndere Olmastroni.

"He died before they could take him to the hospital." Her uncle had been working in the supermarket's greenhouse area, where there was no air-conditioning.

"The temperature was really high and he was a person who had heart problems – a heart attack could have happened at any time but for sure, the heat didn't help," she added. "It was a horrible way to die – at work, and alone.'

Olmastroni is one of five people in Italy whose death over the past week is believed to have been provoked by the extreme heat as a more intense anticyclone, Caronte, broke a temperature record in Rome and nudged the mercury to almost 47C in Sicily. The true death toll is likely to be far greater. All, apart from a 44-yearold road worker who died after collapsing while preparing fresh markings on a street in Milan and whose family is still awaiting the results of an autopsy, had heart-related health issues. They include Ciro Adinolfi, 75, originally from Afragola near Naples, who died in front of his son, also a labourer, while operating a crane on the construction site of an Amazon warehouse in Jesi, in the central Marche region, and Gabriele Lucido, 64, from Salerno in the south. who was found dead in his lodgings after finishing his shift at a construction site in Brescia for TAV, the Italy-France high speed rail project.

In light of the global recognition, Nikfallah emphasizes the importance of preserving Iranian rituals and

traditions, particularly the art of ta'zieh.

"During the Qajar era, ta'zieh performances were held every day in the famous hosseiniyeh of Tehran. This art was brought to life in the best way possible during that period," he says, adding after a pause, "Unfortunately, many people view this art from in light of its sadness. while it can cover a wide range of emotions in different subjects."

Nikfallah's passion for ta'zieh is deeply rooted in his love for Ahl al-Bayt.

"The friendship and love of Ahl al-Bayt is mixed with my mother's milk in my being. When I love Imam Hussain, my words will influence the hearts of the friends of Ahl al-Bayt, attracting a noble audience and lovers of them.'

As for the future, Nikfallah has a wish for the world of art.

"I wish ta'zieh, with its artistic, religious and ritual scope, could become a university majors so that lovers of this art can learn it in an academic way."
