The museum houses artifacts that tell the story of Semnan's cultural and historical development, including handwritten Holy Qur'ans, traditional lighting tools, Safavid-era porcelain, and important historical documents. These collections provide a vivid window into the region's rich cultural tapestry and historical evolution. Joining the alliance marks an
